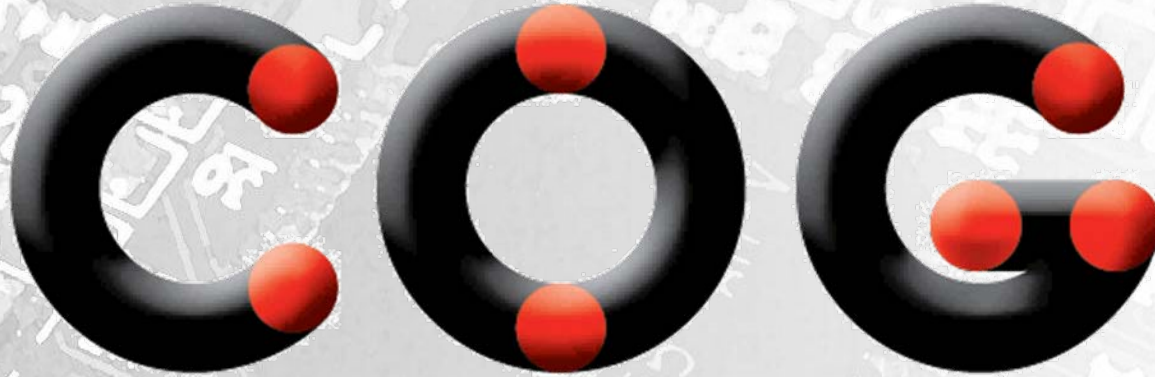

What is Obsolescence?

- Obsolescence is the unavailability of parts, or services that were previously available, they could have been withdrawn for many reasons- technical ,financial, legal and others
- Obsolescence Management is the need to understand why this has happened , to plan and mitigate the instances in future
- Obsolescence concerns materials, components, processes and software. It can occur in all parts of the life cycle of components: Development, Design, production and in service
- It affects components which are need to be maintained for long periods of time which can be 30 years or more



Reasons for Obsolescence

- Technological progress -The innovation cycles, with which components come on the market, become ever shorter and even faster
- Component manufacturers re-assess their product offerings and trim down many “non-profitable” lines.
- Changes in the standardization -“Old” standards are no longer available and are no longer maintained
- Legislation changes e.g. concerning asbestos, cadmium and lead tin solder (RoHS)
- The Original Manufacturer is no longer in business
- The processes, tools and the KNOWLEDGE for maintenance, update or improvement of software are no longer available

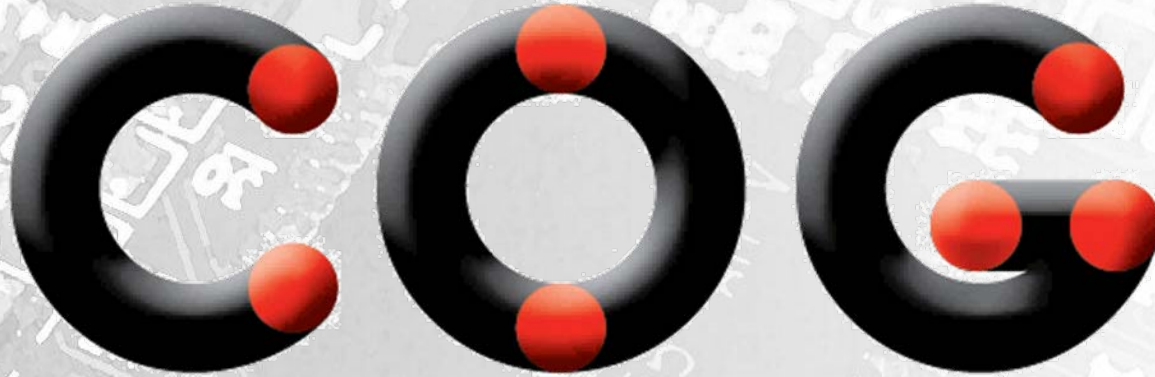


Why is Obsolescence growing?

- Obsolescence is not new- it has always been a factor in design
- Old technology has also been replaced by new technology
- **But:** Today a technology changes in few months and the speed is determined by IT, telecomms, and the consumer electronics industry
 - The consumer market makes money by introducing new improved or fashionable products which create more obsolescence

What is COG?

- COG is a non-profit making special interest group facilitating co-operation on obsolescence matters on a national and international basis
- For a small subscription members are able to expand their personal network to over 300 similar people with a wide range of national, technical and commercial experience
- COG does not sell components or component monitoring tools
- COG encourages supplier members and OEM members to network and that is the main strength of the association



Reactive/Pro-Active Management

- COG promotes Pro-Active management of obsolescence
- Companies tend to introduce Pro-active Obsolescence Management when a major problem occurs.
- There is a danger of unplanned costs for a product redesign before development is completed such as unplanned costs of purchase of components through brokers (who may charge you a premium for locating the parts)
- The aim is that obsolescence can be prevented or its effect reduced by a pro-active mitigation strategy tailored to the situation and the business.



Component Obsolescence Group

- COG was founded in 1997 and is a non-profit making trade association that holds meetings throughout the UK.
- Membership has grown to over 200 companies worldwide
 - *Component manufacturers and distributors*
 - *After market suppliers*
 - *Obsolescence management tool providers*
 - *Government and industry organisations*
 - *OEMs from military, aerospace, telecomms, nuclear power, medical, railways, & oil exploration*
 - *Membership in UK, USA, Germany, Ireland, Denmark, France, the Netherlands, Australia, & Italy.*
- COG Deutschland holds independent meetings in Germany and has over sixty members.
- Further developments to establish COG groups in Italy and France are in advanced stages



Terms of Reference

- Provide education and awareness of the factors which affect obsolescence
- Identify and develop processes for addressing or mitigating the effects of obsolescence
- Communicate and co-operate with other national and international organisations with similar goals
- To stimulate discussion and action between members for the members benefit and to communicate this on to the wider world



COG Working Groups

- COG has set up several expert working groups that meet regularly to focus on specific elements of the organisation such as its structure, web site or publications.
- These are formed from volunteer members interested in that area.
- Membership of the steering group is by election.



COG Steering Group

- Responsible for policy and for the content of Quarterly Meetings in the UK.
- The Steering Group is elected by rotation and the group appoints the COG Chairman and Vice Chairman
- Each respective Chairman will have their own objectives the two biggest current initiatives are membership retention and growth, and marketing the COG brand
- The Chairman works alongside the Secretariat helping COG run in the best way possible reflecting the member's needs and concerns along with bringing in knowledge and concerns from the outside world. We then establish actions to address those needs.



COG Publications and Standardisation Group

- Responsible for input to national and international standardisation
- A major initiative is to write and edit best practice guidance booklets that COG publishes to educate members and non-members on various Obsolescence issues, avoidance of Obsolescence, avoidance of fraud and other topical issues.



COG Workshop Group

- The workshop group manage the workshop content, venues and after event feedback
- Workshops are focused one day training events looking at a single aspect of obsolescence management
- They:
 - Investigate suitable topics
 - Research subject experts within and outside the group
 - Source Speakers
 - Chair and facilitate workshops
 - Write the team exercises
 - Review the feedback

COG Conference Group

- Determines the theme of the International COG conference (ICC)
- Oversees the ICC choice of venue, organisation, Workshop and exhibition
- Manages the technical panel for ICC presentations
- Supports establishing sponsors for the ICC



COG Customer Solutions Group

- Provides advice and information on potential solutions and solution providers
- Provides a look up capability for OEM/CEM members to identify those members able to provide a specific service or product
- To consider ways in which solution providers can contribute to other COG initiatives
